WINTER WEATHER



MACKINAC INLAND & UPPER PENINSULA, MI

Well here it is, September, 28th, Sunday morning at 8 a.m. and 48 seniors have boarded the bus and on our way to Mackinac Itland and Upper Peninsula of Michigan. Bob introduced our bus driver for the trip, Randy, and he then spoke a few words. Bob then had a prayer for safe traveling, strength, and patience for our driver for the five days. About an hour or so down the road, Bey, led us in a "morning devotional" time. She read from the Upper Room, sang three songs, read a poem regarding changes we have in our lives and how the seasons change every year. We then closed with everyone repeating the "Lord's Prayer". It was then mentioned that two people on the bus were celebrating their birthdays, one that day, Judy Erwen and Randy, bus driver, on Saturday. So we all sang "Happy Birthday" to them. Judy then passed out suckers for everyone to enjoy. Thanks, Judy!! After 2 ½ hours, we stopped at a road side park, used the restrooms, and enjoyed Bev's homemade cookies and coffee, tea, or hot chocolate. Yum!! Not much more than 45 minutes or less, we saw signs stating Frankenmuth. Blinked and there it was "Bronner's Christmas Wonderland." All around their yard, were Christmas decorations which looked like a winter wonderland without snow. This store is very large and inside it seems to just keep going, going, and going with such a variety of Christmas decorations everywhere plus had a section for Halloween items. I would hear myself saying, "Oh my, oh my, where do we start?" So the first thing most of us did, was to eat a bite at the little café and then off we went. Keith and I decided to purchase Christmas ornaments for our family and that would special since it was from here. When it was time to return to the bus, there were quite a few "Bonner's" shopping bags or plastic bags boarding the bus. Ha! We then drove to "River Place", which is a group of "specialty shops," built sort in a circle close to the river. Some people shopped, watched people, watched TV in a bar & grill, or just visited among ourselves. Several had to have a little cone/dish of ice cream before we left to register in the hotel for the evening. We returned then to the Zehnder's Splash Village located next door to Bronner's and took our items to our rooms and rested for a little while before going to supper. Around 6 p.m., we were back on the bus and headed down town area to Zehnder's Restaurant for a family meal consisted of Bavarian sausage and chicken plus the trimmings. (A waitress told a group of us that they have 12 dining rooms in the restaurant and serve about 1500 people an hour! There weren't any slow moving waiters or waitresses that we saw!) Our meal was ended with peach strudel and I'm very sure that NO ONE left hungry! Checked out their gift shop for about 20 minutes before we needed to leave on the bus for our motel. Back at the motel, I felt I wanted to walk some around the parking lot to help settle my food plus to enjoy the festive Christmas decorations of Bronner's. It was so beautiful with a quiet evening out and felt myself "smiling" all the time. Just truly undiscribable!!!


Monday morning was rather a lazy one since yesterday was rather a full one of traveling and all had to get up early to leave. After a wonderful breakfast buffet, back on the bus and Randy welcomed all of us and hoped we all were rested and looking forward for another good day. We drove through downtown Frankenmuth and sort of saw that there wasn't anything happening there and noticed that we didn't know where to park the bus and would be a lot of walking again. So it was suggested that we go to an Outlet Mall at Birch Run. We arrived there and was given about 2 ½ hours to go wherever one wanted to go. Again, some people just choose to sit and visit, watch people, or eat some lunch when it was noon, or did go shopping. Keith and I headed to a "Book Warehouse" and both found a book or two. Surprise!! Ha!! At 1:10 p.m. the bus arrived back to the spot we were let out and back on the road again and heading north to Mackinac Bridge and Mackinac City and St. Ignace on the Upper



Peninsula. Keith had a book with information about the bridge and shared it with the people before we arrived. Some of that information is: bridge is 5 miles long, opened up November 1, 1957, cost - 100 million, height in the middle is 199 ft. above the water, Lake Michigan on the west side/Lake Huron on the east, used 41,000 ft, of wire for the main cables and was 24 ½ inches in diameter and held up with 2 steel towers that are 552 ft. above the water. We continued traveling and all of a sudden we noticed that the trees were turning beautiful color of red, gold, orange, ruby, brown, and green. It was very nice to see and made one think how special our "seasons" are and the beauty each one creates. Before we realized, up ahead was the beginning of the bridge. Paid our toll and away we went driving on the bridge and going up higher and higher and listening to the sound of the tires on the bridge and looking down at the rough water, I sure felt a little uneasy for a second or two. Sure glad it wasn't real windy because they say the bridge does move some. Oh my!!! Arrived at our motel for the next three nights, Best Western in St.Ignace. The temperature was 51 degrees at 5 p.m. Rather cool from what we all were used to in Ohio. So out came the heavier coats, gloves and hats. Had a wonderful supper buffet at the motel's dining room of BBQ ribs/chicken and the trimmings. It was inside because of the weather instead of outside on the beach of the lake which I feel was better anyway. When everyone was finished with the meal, Bob reminded everyone that tomorrow we needed to board the bus at 8:20 a.m.

Tuesday morning, we woke up early to allow time to get ready and eat breakfast with a lot of other people. There were two other buses at the same hotel and the dining room was just so large. We did have a certain time to go and that did help some. We arrived and the main dining room full, so Keith and I and several others, took our breakfast out on the closed patio to eat. It was a little cool and one had to eat those scrambled eggs and sausage fast before they got cold! Ha! Loaded up and arrived at the dock in time and we board the Shepler's Ferry boat, hydro-jet boat, to Mackinac Italand. The captain took a little side trip by the bridge, so one could see how it looked being under it and looking up at the very, very large steel structure. It was drizzling some outside, so everyone had to be inside and the windows sort of fogged over and hard to see (temperature outside was 43 degrees with a wind). Arrived at the island at 9:30 a.m. and three wagons were waiting for our group of 49(with the driver) to load for the tour. We were shown around the town, the Grand Hotel, horse stalls/sheds, the farrier's shop, carriage/wagon shop, Governor's Mansion, some resident's homes, and by the Mackinac Fort. We stopped by the famous Grand Hotel, which we had to do a "self-tour" of the place following a map. A hotel staff person mentioned to go up to the cupola on fourth floor to look out and see the bridge, Straits of Mackinac and the beautiful grounds of the hotel. Here in this room was hanging a very beautiful chandelier they received as a gift and made of glass with pink flowers on it. It is hard to describe, one just has to see it. Lots of pictures were taken of it. Took some more pictures outside of the hotel where several people were waiting to use the Taxi carriage to get to downtown, which takes 10 minutes or so to walk there. They waited and waited and nothing and finally decided to walk it slowly and got along o.k. Before Keith and I got to Main Street, we checked out where the first Blacksmith Shop was located on Market Street and looked it over. It isn't used anymore until there is a "special "occasion and then a blacksmith will demonstrate in it. On to Main Street and one could see shop after shop selling t-shirts, clothes, books, toys, souvenirs, places to eat, bikes to rent, candy shops (dozen of Fudge shops - we were told about 1000 pounds of fudge is made in the summer), street cleaning people, wagons carrying hay, and people. After eating a bite and walking around and found some items we wanted, we felt it was getting closer to the time to go to the dock and wait for the ferry for the ride back to the main land. Got ourselves some ice cream and arrived at the dock and found several of our people there to and waiting and eating ice cream. Ha! Four o'clock, the **Shepler Ferry** loaded us on and this time, Keith and I and some of our other people decided to try and ride on the top. It was a little cold but you could see a lot better and with a hat or hood, it just wasn't that bad. Supper then was scheduled for 5:15 p.m. at the **Mackinac Grill in St. Ignace**. We had several main items to pick from and then the rest of the meal we had to take. Ours was very good and being outside all day, doing all that walking, it seemed we all were rather hungry. Ha! The **Best Western** had offered to take anyone that wanted to go to the **Kewadin Shores Casino** that evening, they would take them and pick them up later. Some of the group wanted to go and had a good time. The rest of us headed to our rooms and collapsed.

Wednesday was another very busy day planned. Checked the temperature and it was 53 degrees for the morning/day and partly sunny. Had our breakfast and loaded on the bus and heading to Whitefish Point on the Upper Peninsula. Arrived at the Great Lakes Shipwreck Museum by Lake Superior. The items and stories were well done, I felt, and very easy to understand. While reading the stories, seeing the items recovered, it was rather a very sobering time to me. The only wreck I really knew about was the "Edmund Fitzgerald" in November 10, 1975. Again, reading the account, it sort of just gave me a funny feeling. From here, one was able to walk through other buildings: home of the light house keeper & family; coast guard shop; the gift shop; and then you could walk out towards the lake on a dock. One wasn't allowed in the lighthouse, but we could hear the "fog" horn. Soon it was time again to get on the bus and go to the Tahquamanon Falls. We were to be there at noon for lunch and shop at their Gift Shop before the tour to the falls. A lady Forest Ranger led our group through the woods to the falls and shared the story about the area and what all she does being a ranger. She stated that last winter they received about 215 inches of snow and that sure kept them busy. Most of us stopped at the 1/3 mile part of the path to see the "high" falls and the rest of the group continued on and went down 94 steps to get a little closer to the falls towards the bottom part of them. This fall is the second largest waterfall east of the Mississippi River. They were very beautiful and such a roaring sound it made. The trees surrounding the falls, made a beautiful picture with the color of the leaves. Before boarding the bus, it was again time for a treat of ice cream and away we went again heading for Sault St. Marie, Michigan. This then made us at the east point of the Upper Peninsula by the St. Lawrence Sea Way and meeting Lake Superior. We arrived at the dock a half hour early and one could shop again for "souvenirs" that we hadn't got before or still need. Ha! About 5:30 p.m. our boat, "Holiday" was ready and we went to the dining room for our tables. We enjoyed a buffet supper of chicken and pork chop with the extras and cake later. The boat was going through the Soo Locks and when down eating and entering the locks, some of us went up on the top deck to see better the operation. We were on the American side of the locks and took about 12 minutes to raise our boat up to go out. The gates opened and away we went. The captain drove us around the lake a little, past a steel mill that refines iron ore into steel (on the Canadian side) and then headed back to the locks to return to the dock. If I remembered right, going back through, it took only 8 minutes to lower the water for us and away we went. It was so amazing to me how this all works and still don't understand it at all but very fascinating to me. Just think, the people in town, have to carry their Pass Ports with them all the time in case they need to cross the river into Canada and the other way for the Canadian people. 




