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HOW DOES YOUR GARDEN GROW:

Should you look out at certain trees in your landscape you might see the predictors of the upcoming spring season. I have a giant pussy willow that is starting to pop open its' catkins. Even though there is snow covering almost everything outside life is still there. Soon we will see some songbirds flying through to get to their breeding areas.

My hasn't this been an interesting winter as last year we are seeing the threat of record cold and so much snow in some parts of our country that most of us are ready for it to be over. But as with all things there is only one thing we can do about this weather is to wait it out.

But if you are ready for some gardening you can get a jump on it by starting something inside your home. All you need to do is bundle up and grab your pruners and go outside to that pussy willow, forsythia or even a flowering crabapple and cut some small year old branches and take them inside and put them in a vase and watch what happens. In a few days you should see the buds swell and then break open to reveal a beautiful flower or catkin. And that makes any dreary room so much better.

Now is the time to start some seeds but remember to read the package and only start the ones that say to start inside eight to ten weeks before last frost, that is usually May 10-15. Have fun.
