COVID – 19 Trip Policy

Masks are optional while on the motor coach but please bring a mask with you as many of the stops that we visit may require them. If someone is not willing to wear a mask, they should not sign up for a trip.

Vaccination or tests will not be required to travel with the Senior Center but is strongly encouraged. We trust that everyone traveling with us is adult enough to monitor their own health and not get on the motor coach if they are sick in any way.

Exiting the coach will be from the front to the back to avoid contact with others. Please note that if you are in the back, you will be the last off.

Refund policy has not changed. If the Senior Center has to cancel a trip for any reason, full refunds will be given. If a traveler cancels a trip before final payment is due, a full refund is given. If a traveler cancels after the final payment date, a refund will be issued only if we sell their seat or we are able to get refunds from the vendors.

For travelers who are not members, the Senior Center will need their name, phone number and address in case of contract tracing.

Our Trip to the Northwoods of Wisconsin with Country Travel Discoveries

August 28th – September 3, 2021

What a wonderful week spent in the **Northwoods of Wisconsin**. With **Tonya** as the coordinator, **Ann** as our tour guide, and **David** as our bus driver, we couldn't have asked for a better team to be a part of our adventure.

We started out the first day and traveled to Fond du Lac where we had a welcoming dinner and stayed at the historic Hotel Retlaw.

After a wonderful breakfast at the hotel, we began a busy Sunday. Our first stop was a peaceful cruise on Waupaca's Chain of Lakes and lunch at their dockside Clear Water Harbor Boat House. We visited the Leigh Yawkey Woodson Art Museum where they were showcasing a quilt display. Outside they had a garden area with several metal sculptures. Later we visited with Jim Harris who has traveled to Laos and Cambodia many times to help dismantle unexploded devices. He has collected many things over the years and has a museum filled with items and pictures that depict the lives of those living in the region. A group he is associated with continues to help war victims in numerous ways.

The third day, after breakfast, we started out with a guided bus tour of Rib Mountain which peaks at 1,942 feet. The State Park consists of 1600 acres and has an outdoor amphitheater, trails, shelters, rock formations, and a 60-foot observation tower. Our next stop was a tour of a farm that grows ginseng - it takes approximately 5 years for the roots to reach a marketable size and growing areas require 70-85% shade. The root is used in Asian medicines. We received samples of ginseng candy and tea. Our next stop was to the only easily accessible 45 X 90-degree point in the world. The other three are located in the Pacific Ocean, China, and the Indian Ocean. The marker is in Marathon County in a farmer's field. A quarter of a mile walking path has signs and benches and a monument to mark the spot. We each received a commemorative coin for joining the 45 X 90 club. We ate lunch at Billie Bob's, a local grill and pub. During the afternoon we visited the Dr. Kate Museum. Dr. Kate Pelham Newcomb is remembered as "The Angel on Snowshoes" for her dedication in reaching patients during winter months. She spearheaded a movement to build a hospital in the tiny town of Woodruff. Local students sought to collect a million pennies for Dr. Kate's hospital. Dr. Kate was featured on a segment of the television show - This Is Your Life. The highlight of the evening was attending a snowshoe baseball game at Lake Tomahawk between the Snowhawks and celebrities from a local television channel. Volunteers served sandwiches, drinks, and their famous pie. During the game we watched for a painted cantaloupe to be thrown in place of the oversized baseball they use for the game. We stayed in our new home for three nights - the Best Western Plus Concord Inn.

Day four started with breakfast and a trip to **Bartling's Manitowish Cranberries.** Their crop is grown in low lying areas. Water is used for irrigation, frost protection, winter flooding for weather protection, and harvesting. The fruit is harvested in the flooded marsh to gently remove the berries from the vines. The cranberries are processed at the farm and sold to Ocean Spray. We received some samples before we left. Our next stop was **Stormy Kromer**, where they make iconic railroad caps manufactured since 1903. Our first visit for the day was made to the Upper Peninsula of Michigan to see the picturesque **Bond Falls** on the Ontonagon River. We spent a relaxing evening on our own.

On Wednesday, after breakfast, we stopped at the **Oneida County Courthouse** which was built in 1906 and has a beautiful stained-glass dome. We were introduced to the Hodag there. Next, we went to the **Northwoods Petroleum Museum** which is filled with vintage petroleum equipment. We had some free time and lunch in downtown Eagle River. During the afternoon we went to **Fred Scheer's Lumberjack Show** — an interesting and fun competition between 2—man teams. They did some sawing, climbing, log rolling, and relays. That evening we had dinner at a traditional supper club (**Little Bohemia**) where **John Dillinger's gang** had a shootout. In an upstairs area of the supper club, there are bullet holes that have been preserved along with articles about the historic event.

Thursday we were treated to a wonderful breakfast prepared for us by a caterer. We visited the Pioneer Park Historical Complex in Rhinelander where we learned more about the Hodag, a local legend since 1896. Some say that the Hodag is the fiercest, strangest, most terrifying monster ever to set razor-sharp claws on the earth. Others describe it as a reclusive woodland creature, misunderstood by many and only wanting to be left along. When something out of the ordinary occurs, people will say, "I think it was a Hodag." Touring the historical complex, we saw a sawmill, a schoolhouse, a Civilian Conservation Corps exhibit, fire equipment, antique outboard motors, a logging display and a railroad display. Lunch was at a local grill and pub called BB Jack's. We visited Mepp's Fishing Lures Factory and found they buy squirrel tails to use in their lures. We toured Twig's a producer of unique sodas and flavors including their best-known flavor Sundrop. We had a farewell dinner at our hotel on the Oneida Reservation (Radisson Hotel and Conference Center). A casino, which some of us visited, is connected to the hotel. The artwork in the rooms and in the hallways and lobby reflects the culture of the Oneidas.

On our last day, we had a delicious breakfast at the hotel and toured the beautiful **Green Bay Botanical Gardens.** They were featuring **Washed Ashore: Art to Save the Sea.** There are 8 sea animal sculptures made from trash and debris found in bodies of water as a way of helping people learn more about plastic pollution. We headed to **Mars Cheese Castle in Kenosha** where we had lunch and a chance to buy Wisconsin cheese curds and other goodies before heading home.

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
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
