His name was Fleming, and he was a poor Scottish farmer. One day, while trying to make a living for his family, he heard a cry for help coming from a nearby bog. He dropped his tools and ran to the bog. There, mired to his waist in black mud, was a terrified boy, screaming and struggling to free himself. Farmer Fleming saved the lad from what could have been a slow and terrifying death.

The next day, a fancy carriage pulled up to the Scotsman's sparse surroundings. An elegantly dressed nobleman stepped out and introduced himself as the father of the boy farmer Fleming had saved. "I want to repay you," said the nobleman, "you saved my son's life."

"No, I can't accept payment for what I did," the Scottish farmer replied waving off the offer. At that moment, the farmer's own son came to the door of the family hovel.

"Is that your son?" asked the nobleman. "Yes," replied the farmer proudly. "I'll make a deal with you," said the nobleman. "Let me provide your son with the level of education my own son will enjoy. If the lad is anything like his father, he'll no doubt grow to be a man we will both be proud of." And he did just that!

Farmer Fleming's son attended the very best schools and, in time, he graduated from St. Mary's Hospital Medical School in London. He went on to become known throughout the world as the noted Sir Alexander Fleming, the discoverer of penicillin.

Years afterward, the same nobleman's son who was saved from the bog was stricken with pneumonia. What saved his life this time? Penicillin. The name of the nobleman? Lord Randolph Churchill. His son's name? Sir Winston Churchill.

Someone once said, "What goes around, comes around."
We Christians may call it "The Golden Rule," or as
Matthew 7:12 says, "In everything, do to others as you would
have them do to you; for this is the law and the prophets." This is
the foundation of active goodness and mercy—the kind God
shows to us every day. Think of a good and merciful action—and





When does Christian Education stop? NEVER!

Make a commitment that will challenge your faith and Biblical understanding as you continue on your faith journey. Church worship is necessary, but you can't interact with others, see other points of view, discuss issues with other Christians.

Sit in on any of the following adult classes:

Sanctuary Class (meets in the sanctuary) - Uses the Adult Bible Studies series, which is designed to help adults understand the meaning and authority of the Bible for Christian life and, this fall they will be studying the Books of Hebrews and Acts. Over the years, the size of the class has dwindled from the 20s to a dozen to now about 5 or 6 regular attendees with frequent visitors. The class is taught on a rotating basis by Sara McCune, Becky Cox, David Herr, and Duane Bollenbacher.

All visitors and/or possible new members are always welcome.

Open Heart Class (meets in Oppermann Hall) - Uses the Adult Bible Series as well.

Richard Jordan's Class (meets in Oppermann Hall in the parlor area) – Uses The Present Word series. They will be studying faith issues—what is faith, who understands it, what does faith cost?

No Name Class (meets in the church parlor upstairs) facilitated by Pastor Carol. The first discussion will be a one-session video entitled New Beginnings which explores the myriad of ways older adults can become involved in new and exciting ministries.

After that, for the next six weeks, the class will be looking at Tony Campolo's Curing Affluence. Tony tackles the issues of our money, our time, and our "stuff."

Children's Sunday School will be taught by Julie Court, our Bluffton University student. They will be using the series Holy Moley which is also a video series with other interactive activities involved. They will study Old Testament people and their stories.

All classes begin at 9:30 on Sunday, September 9. See you there—it's the happenin' place!

- 4) Avoid traveling by air, rail, or water because 16% of all accidents involve these forms of transportation.




5) Of the remaining 33%, 32% of all deaths occur in hospitals. So, above all else, avoid hospitals!



'A Salute to the United Church of Christ' is the subject of the latest blog post of Bishop John Shelby Spong, a retired bishop of the Episcopal Church, based in Newark, N.J. In the current entry on his website, A New Christianity for a New World, Spong, 81, praised the UCC for its mettle and thanked the denomination's leadership for its insight.

"Perhaps, I thought, this church can be the one Christian denomination that will inspire, bring about and participate in the necessary reformation required to break the Christian faith out of its dying patterns, [it's] no longer believable theological understandings and its medieval worship practices," Spong wrote.

Spong, an author of 22 books that have sold more than a million



Spong ended his blog with the following:

"These four churches I have described so briefly had several things in common. They each had a well-trained and well-educated senior pastor. Each was linked to a national denomination that encouraged them to press the edges. Each had drunk deeply of that denomination's courage in the public arena on the right side of the cultural issues of our day.

"If the United Church of Christ is represented locally by the churches I have encountered in Wichita, Greeley, Norman and Hendersonville, they must be doing something right.

"So to these churches and to the leadership of the National United Church of Christ, I first raise my hand in salute for your courage and your dedication. Second, I stand before you in awe for what you have meant in my life and in the life of Christianity itself. Third, I bow my head and my heart in thanksgiving for your witness to the Truth."


