





Naturalist Notebook

"How Full the Earth is!"

I like many of you, am a busy person. My work keeps me busy! Since starting my career here at JAMPD, I am always on the go: leading hikes, wrangling education animals like snakes and snapping turtles, and teaching the lovely people of Allen County all about science and nature. I'm often on the go in my spare time as well: supporting the arts in 3 counties and baking are my hobbies. Not to mention my husband and I enjoy birding around Ohio and Michigan, which is full of really beautiful destinations (and birds)! And now we're house hunting! But sometimes, a girl has just got to sit and rest. And so, I have become a casual video-gamer.

But something that always bothers me about video games is that when you see a plant, it might as well be a cardboard cutout of a plant.

In real life, you can look at a plant and see much more than just the plant itself. You can see insects taking shelter in the leaves, drinking the nectar, or doing any number of things! You may find mosses or lichens or mushrooms growing on the plant. If we looked even deeper, on the microscopic level, there would be even more tiny, amazing creatures utilizing the plant, like waterbears and diatoms (look them up!). If you ask enough questions, one single plant can be the start of a lifetime's worth of research.

Summer is a great time, because so many different living things are all around us! Flowers are blooming, tree leaves have sunlight streaming through, butterflies and moths are flourishing, birds are flying through the air, turtles and fish are swimming in

ponds close enough to the surface for us to see them live their beautiful lives. Each one holds its own mysteries and stories to tell, if we are curious and brave enough to ask and to learn.

And that is what I love about the world! It is so full of both lore and mysteries. I love learning new things, and I believe that no knowledge is ever wasted. Learning connects us to the past, as every answer comes from a question asked by someone else who asked before us. Learning is a conversation, where we hear what has been discovered by others, then think and ask something new. Learning brings people together, as we teach others what we have learned and foster curiosity in others.

He meant that by going to the same place 100 times, you will notice new things and look a little deeper each time. When going to a new place, you may only notice the surface level. This summer, I challenge you to do both! Go to a new place. We have 20 parks in Allen County for you to explore, for free, open every day. Then go to a familiar place several times. Maybe one of our parks that you are more familiar with. Let me know what you think, what you observe, what you learn. Where will you learn more?

I will leave you with one of my favorite quotes, which I think about often:





COMMON AND CUT-LEAF TEASEL CONTROL

Teasel is an invasive weed of open spaces. It outcompetes native prairie flowers and grasses. Teasel seed heads will be removed shortly after flowering, in mid-July for one month, before seeds mature. Seed heads will be clipped from stalks and bagged for disposal. The stalks will be clipped just above the ground to prevent resprouting. Removal will be conducted at several park locations throughout the summer on Mondays and Thursdays from 8am to 11 am and noon to 2:30/3:00pm. See date and location schedule below.
